



Each issue contained an editorial page, Interview of seniors, Organization news, Class news, Grade news, Advertisements and, of course, Gossip pages. Only a few changes were made from last years school paper. A page of general interest items and the hot lunch menus were added. The "Eagles Cry" exchanged papers with approximately 12 different neighboring schools each month. The staff put forth long hours to produce a school paper which would reflect the feelings and happenings of Allen High School.
